1975 has been a quiet and somewhat difficult year for the National University Caving Club with only a relatively small (about 12) number of trips having been run. New members and prospective members of the club are reminded that the level of activity of any club is directly related to the amount of interest and enthusiasm shown by the bulk membership.

The number of trips run during 1975 thus indicates a general lethargy amongst members, a situation which it is hoped will be remedied in the 1976 caving year.

Preparation for the Australian Speleological Federation's 11th Biennial Convention to be held at Christmas time 1976 are well in hand, the National University Caving Club and the Canberra Speleological Society acting as co-hosts to the conference. this regard the club must recognise its responsibilities in 1976 to ensure that the 11th conference is a success. The A.N.U. Sports Union is to be thanked for the assistance which they have already

Furthermore, in 1976 the Caving Club must continue to foster good relations with A.S.F., Australia's national caving regulatory body, to which the National University Caving Club is affiliated. Good relations with the A.S.F. will lead to better caving.

I am pleased to report that the administration of the club is in good shape and the club has satisfied nearly all of its obligations to the A.S.F. and other points of contact throughout Australia. is hoped that our good administrative record is not allowed to lapse in the future.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the 1975 executive for their assistance throughout the year and I extend my good wishes to the soon-to-be-elected 1976 executive for a successful coming year. Due to personal commitments I will not be standing for re-election this year.

EQUIPMENT OFFICER'S REPORT 1975/76

The past year was rather quiet as regards trips, so the equipment to a large extent did not suffer too much wear.

New Equipment

The Blue Water III rope which was originally ordered two years ago still has not been received though delivery is expected early this year. *

Damages

Most of the damages this year have resulted because of aging rather than use. Four of the lead-acid lamps expired during the year. Two were four years old and were club equipment, the other two were donated by ex-members and were likewise about four years old.

Two 150 foot nylon number 3 ropes will have to be retired this year due to age effects, but the Blue Water is expected to amply cover their duties in most instances. Lost

NATIONAL UNIVERSITY CAVING CLUB

1976 Information Sheet

ABOUT THE CLUB

National University Caving Club was formed in 1964 with twelve members. Soon after it was affiliated with the A.N.U. Sports Union. We receive an annual grant from the Sports Union which enables us to obtain equipment so that we can do any cave on the Australian mainland or run several trips simultaneously.

In 1969 NUCC was accepted as a full member of the Australian Speleological Federation. This enables us (along with the other 18 ASF societies) to visit caves in such areas as Cooleman, Tuglow, Wombeyan, Colong, Yarrangobilly and Jenolan, that are not open to members of the general public, and as these are among the best caving areas in the state, is of great benefit to us.

CAVING TRIPS

NUCC runs trips most weekends throughout the year. Trips are usually one or two days, but occasionally longer trips are run at Easter, on long weekends or in the vacations.

A wide variety of caves occur in the Canberra area and should satisfy most tastes, viz: long, short, large, small, wet, dry, cold, warm, deep, shallow, and dark or very dark.

After a period of introduction cavers eventually become more specialised into such categories as cave mapping, photography, exploration, numbering and recording, touristing, walking, drinking or just plain slothing around.

Membership fees are only \$3.00 per year, and for this members get free use of club lights, bash hats, ladders, ropes etc., get sent the club newsletter about 4 times per year, and the ASF newsletter quarterly. Members also have access to the club library which contains numerous books and articles on caving and all aspects of speleology (as well as many cave maps).

Every year a number of trips are organised to introduce new members and others to the sport of caving.

What to Bring

- Cut lunch (students in hall should organise beforehand).
- Change of clothes.
- Some old but sturdy clothes to wear underground. A boiler suit is ideal.

WEE JASPER TRIP REPORT (13/5/76)

In the early morning on Thursday, 13th May our small but ambitious group left for the small village of Wee Jasper, S.W. of Yass.

After a $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour journey along the scenic route, we arrived at our destination at 8.30 a.m.

For starters we inspected Signature Cave (WJ7) as Philip Allen and David Reith had not seen this. We made a special detour to check whether the Tunnel, the lower entrance to Punchbowl (WJ8) was still cemented off. I am happy to report that it has not been dug out and is providing an effective barrier against vandals.

As we still had plenty of time before lunch and felt active, we descended the 28' pitch entrance to the Gong (Extension No. 4 of Dip) and made our way to the gong room, which we all agreed was in excellent condition and beautiful.

When we emerged from gong we had our lunch and proceeded into dip (WJ1). For the remainder of the afternoon we explored in succession: No. 2 series, No. 3 Series (in particular the No. 3 extension), the main chamber of the No. 4 Series and some of the No. 5 Series.

We emerged at 7.00 p.m. and after some cleaning, returned to the road.

WYANBENE TRIP REPORT (20/6/76)

Party: Peter Hart (L), Michael McKenzie.

On the morning of Sunday, 20th June, our small party proceeded towards Krawaree, via Captain's Flat. We reached the Gundillion turnoff to the cave and easily forded the Shoalhaven River.

As our luck would have it, a small amount of rain had fallen over the previous couple of days, and the track in was slippery. (You guessed it, we got bogged!)

The local farmer came to our assistance and pulled us out with his tractor. Finally, after an hours delay we reached the camping ground.

Before entering it, we had lunch and some people from C.S.S. (Canberra Speleological Society) arrived.

At approximately 12.00 o'clock we entered the WY1 entrance and made our way along the stream passage. The cave is at present relatively dry, and the flowstone climb to the blowhole was not at all slippery.

We proceeded as far as "Aitcheson's Bypass" and explored "Aitcheson's Avens", before returning home.

WYANBENE CAVE DESCRIPTION

For the benefit of those who have not been to or heard of Wyanbene, I will give a brief description.

Wyanbene Cave (WY1, WY2) is located about 48 km South of Braidwood, near Krawaree. The cave has been surveyed by NUCC and 1830 m. of passage are mapped, making it equal 3rd longest in N.S.W.

At the WYl entrance there is a small ladder which leads to the stream passage. If one follows this upstream, a sump is reached. At this point, one has the choice of turning into the former tourist cavern (used in early 1900's) or climbing a flowstone wall and passing through a hole known as the blowhole (because of the strong breeze usually associated with it).

From here, it descends via an 8m. ladder pitch and rejoins the stream passage. Following this, one passes a number of interesting chambers, such as the "Jailhouse", "Cleopatra's Bath" and "Helictite Chamber".

Up to this point, the caver has managed to keep reasonably dry, however things will soon change when the "wet stretch" is reached. This section almost completely saturates the person who is keen enough to proceed this far. Fortunately this may be partially avoided by "Aitcheson's Bypass".

Eventually, the passage opens up into the "Rockfall Chamber". At the top of this, to the left, one gains entrance to "Caesar's Hall" a large chamber of impressive dimensions. On the right of "Rockfall" is a passage leading to the "Gunbarrel Aven", a large rising shaft 110m. high and yet to be properly explored.

In the roof of "Caesar's Hall" there are a couple of holes, also unexplored. It is thought that these may be part of the upper levels and may connect with "Gunbarrel" as well as bypassing the sump at "Frustration Lake", which is at present the end of the cave.

At the bottom of "Caesar's Hall" is a pool of clear water which becomes muddy on disturbance and is known as "Diarrhoea Pit". A few more 6m. climbs brings one up to "Frustration Lake" and the known end (?)






